Lenten Study: "Lenten Reflections on the Parable of The Prodigal Son" by Henry Nouwen. He is the author of "The Return of the Prodigal Son, A Story of Homecoming," and "Home Tonight." Both reveal God's promise that we can always return to our true home (God's Love and presence) regardless of how far we stray.

Jesus' story of the Prodigal Son is written only in St. Luke's Gospel found in Chapter 15: 11-32. This Lent we will pray, read and

study this text of scripture with the daily reflections of Henri Nouwen. We will have the opportunity to share our understandings weekly with others in small group gatherings. We will hear the basic teachings presented from Jesus parable each Sunday in the sermons. We will reflect on the father in the parable, who is a figure of our Father in heaven, whose very nature is love, forgiveness and reconciliation.

There is much more in the story to explore and discover. This is not just a parable of the Prodigal Son, for the first line says "there was a man with two sons." It is a parable about two sons an elder and a younger.

Themes of sinfulness, resentment, disobedience, anger, and rejection of the father's love and even homelessness are all found in the characters of these sons in parable. We may identify with each of these sons and themes as it has pertained to our own relationships with Our Father in heaven at vari-

like St. Anne's. There is approximately 4 hours per session which is done over a six month window of time.

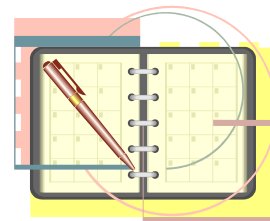

What have St. Anne's youth been up to?

St. Anne's middle and high school youth meet on Sunday nights from 5:00-8:00pm. During our time together, we play games outside like Extreme Frisbee, softball, and football. Inside, we have played cooperative games that have allowed us to get to know one another better, and build a cohesive group. We share a meal, provided by parents, a lesson from the J2A formation program and a brief time for worship.

Lessons have focused on learning about who we are as individuals, and our unique gifts given to us by God, and used by God, through Christ as we spread the gospel in our daily lives. We have looked at images of Christ in artwork, and talked about how we are created in His image. At the beginning of Advent we reviewed a NOOMA video called Kickball. We talked a lot about how we often think getting the things we want will make us happy and how things don't really make us happy. Instead, the relationships we have in our lives bring us joy.

Advent also brought us together for special outreach, in-reach, and worship activities.

Ranzi Bete, Aric Jackson, Komuri Lejukole, Phoebe Teague, and Hebe Sankey, and Jared and Annika Baker all participated in the Christmas Boutique on December 12. They helped shoppers shop, wrapped gifts, made Christmas cards and entertained young children, and helped with packing up and cleaning up remaining merchandise. We offer a special thank-you to Fr. Sunday, December 20, Hebe Sankey, Phoebe Teague, Iryl Bacdayan and Ranzi Bete assisted with the Christmas Pageant rehearsal and caring for

several of St. Anne's preschool and school-age children for the Drop and Shop. The youth prepared lunch, led children in rousing games of "Simon Says, and "Follow the Leader", and together all enjoyed the movie "The Best Christmas Pageant Ever", complete with popcorn. We thank Stephen and Anne Sankey for bringing the meal and helping our youth. We also thank Jessica Carlson for her help with craft ideas.

It has been a great year. We look forward to the many activities coming in 2010. Many are sponsored by the Diocese of Iowa and include a January Ski Trip, Happening #28 for high school youth in March, New Beginnings for our middle school youth in April, summer camp for grades 3-12 in June, and the Pine Ridge Mission Trip for those having completed grades 7-12 in July. We hope to add a lock in, and some off-site winter and spring excursions for our youth as well.

It takes a commitment from our youth, parents, and leaders to make this programming possible. Youth depend on parents to help them see these activities as important pieces of lifelong Christian formation. They depend on their parents and other adults for transportation, communication, meals, and encouragement.

Communication is also a key component in the success of our youth programming. We attempt to contact our youth and parents through a variety of tools. These include: e-mail, newsletters, bulletin announcements, Facebook and phone calls. Youth leaders appreciate it when youth or their parents return messages advising of youth intention to participate in activities. It is helpful and courteous so that all necessary arrangements can be made.

We are always looking

for additional adult helpers. We especially need people to provide meals on Sunday evenings, provide transportation occasionally, and to help contact youth and parents by telephone to remind them of upcoming meetings and events. 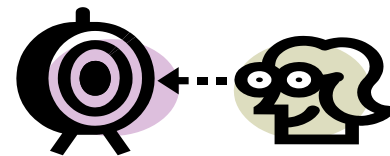

My Resolution

Suggestions for making Resolutions "fail-proof"

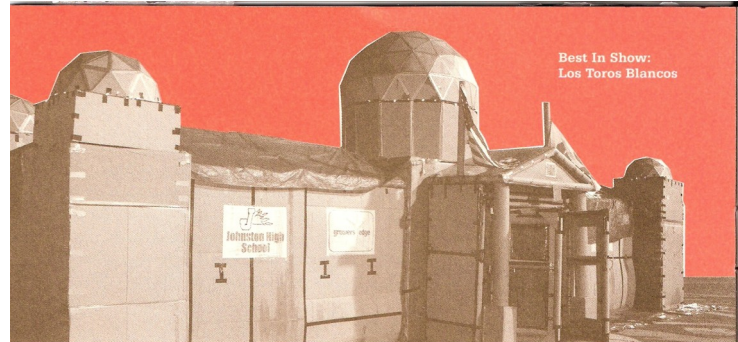

EMERGENCY BEDS NEEDED

The closing of the YWCA in downtown Des Moines has created a very difficult situation for the women and children living there. Iowa Homeless Youth Center (IHYC) housed 63 young women at the YWCA in temporary emergency beds in 2009. Those beds will no longer be available as of February 1. IHYC can move these emergency beds to our already existing residential programs at "The Lighthouse" and the "Buchanan House." In order to do this IHYC needs to have two twin beds with mattresses and box springs donated. **If you have a bed you could donate please contact Mary Oliver at mmo492@q.com or Toni Nicol, of Iowa Homeless Youth Center, at TNicol@yss.ames.ia.us.**

The emergency beds are used for young women and their children who will be on the street the night they contact or are found by our staff. These emergency beds are extremely important in IHYC's effort to help young women find a safe place to stay, often on the first day they find themselves homeless. The young woman and her children stay in the emergency beds while they and staff work together to arrange for a safe place for them either in a shelter, an apartment, in one of our residential beds. We also have emergency beds for young men at the YMCA. Currently those beds are still open and available to young men who are homeless.

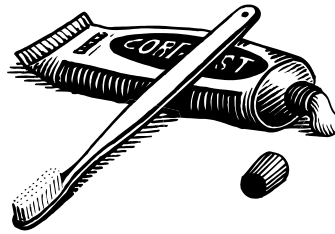
By the way, the DMARC food Pantry serves all the metro area (including Ankeny). The Ankeny Food Pantry is not an independent function. They order from the DMARC warehouse just like all the other nine pantries. When people call in to DMARC office, we give them the proper pantry location according to their home address. No one is allowed to

jump from pantry to pantry, By the nine pantries (including Ankeny), being a part of the larger organization, equal distribution is insured.

As always, money is appreciated. There are envelopes by the baskets. DMARC can buy more food at reduced price when they receive monetary donations.

Thanks to all for their participation. Needs are great, especially at this time of the year, as well as unemployment and economic downturn."

The Rt. Rev. Zache Duracin is Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti. He is unharmed; his wife suffered an injury to her foot.

The Episcopal Church in Haiti has lost a cathedral, convent, Holy Trinity Complex, College St. Pierre, and a Jubilee Center.

The Episcopal Church's three missionaries who were in Haiti are all accounted for - Mallory Holding, Jude Harmon, and Oge Beauvoir, who is the dean of the Theological Seminary, along with his wife Serette.

The Diocesan offices are located in Port-au-Prince.

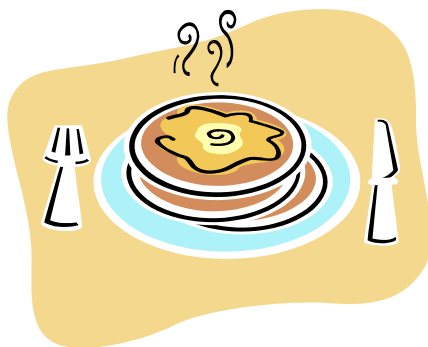

The following is from Rob Radtke, President of Episcopal Relief & Development

Haiti: The Three "Rs" of Disasters

It is important to remember that all disasters have a life cycle: "The Three Rs of Disasters."

Right now, we are in the "Rescue" phase. All hands are on deck to save lives and property. This phase involves finding and treating the immediate medical needs of survivors and stabilizing ongoing hazards, such as shifting buildings. As such, it is best left to the heavy lifters - government and military search and rescue teams. These groups also have heavy equipment that can clear roads and debris, as well as large specialized operations with mass distribution systems that have pre-positioned warehouses. The "Rescue" phase typically lasts a week, but with the extraordinary logistical hurdles being faced in Haiti, it may take longer.

The next phase is the "Relief" phase, where the focus is on creating temporary safe and sanitary conditions. As I saw in Katrina, the church is often one of the first places people go to seek assistance and shelter. We have already heard that in rural and outlying areas around the earthquake zone, existing clinics are seeing patients who have been able to get out of Port-au-Prince. Some of these clinics are expanding patient

care to schools and church buildings. The "Relief" phase typically lasts a few months.

Finally, we get to the third and final phase: "Recovery." During recovery the emphasis shifts to restoring services, rebuilding houses and buildings, and returning to self-sufficiency.

The Diocese of Haiti has a very large and vibrant social infrastructure and we fully expect that Episcopal Relief & Development will be there for the long haul supporting their important and vibrant ministries.

The challenge of the "Recovery" phase is that most of the television cameras have moved on, but the human suffering has grown. It is a chronic state, not a crisis. However, it is the phase that Episcopal Relief & Development and its partners excel at, because we work with churches that are part of the communities and know the needs best and how to meet them. This phase will last years. The unmet needs in a place like Haiti - which already struggles with immense, chronic poverty - will be monumental.

Right now Episcopal Relief & Development is focused on preparing for the "Relief" phase and securing the resources for the "Recovery" phase.

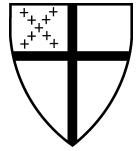
